Adjective Order and Punctuation

When we use more than one adjective to describe a noun, we must use a specific order for these adjectives. The chart below shows the different categories of adjectives and the order they are placed in front of the noun.

A. In the examples below, we do not put commas between the adjectives because they are all from different categories. These are called *Cumulative Adjectives*

Examples:

1. One mean big old round white sheep-herding dog lives next door.

2. *Two beautiful small antique square brown Canadian maple* coffee tables are on sale at the antique store downtown.

B. If a sentence has more than one adjective from the same category, then we need to put commas between them. You can also tell if you need commas if you can put 'and' between the adjectives and it sounds okay. These are called **Coordinate Adjectives.**

Examples:

- 1. The kind, handsome man helped me with my shopping bags.
- * kind & handsome are both opinion adjectives, so a comma or and can be used
- 2. The blonde, blue-eyed woman wore a beautiful white dress.
- * blonde & blue-eyed are both colour adjectives, so a comma or and can be used
