## **Commas, Semicolons & Colons**

#### A. When to use commas:

1. After introductory words, phrases, or dependent clauses

Jeff, please close the door.

Barking loudly, the dog ran in circles

Before we go to the movie, I have to wash the dishes.

2. Before a coordinating conjunction joining two independent clauses

I would like to go to the movie, but I'm too tired.

3. Before and after a phrase containing non-essential information or an interrupting clause

Nick, who struggled with grades in high school, is doing quite well in college.

Watching English movies, for example, is an excellent way to improve listening skills.

4. Between items in a series

I had soup, salad, and a sandwich for lunch.

5. After a conjunctive adverb

My course schedule will be heavy next term; therefore, I've decided to cut back my other activities.

#### B. When to use semicolons:

1. Between two related sentences

Jessica loves swimming; she hates scuba diving.

2. Before a conjunctive adverb

My sister loves travelling; therefore, she's always looking for the best travel deals.

#### 3. To separate items in a list when the items already contain commas

I've traveled to a number of places, such as Paris, France; London, England; and Montreal, Quebec

### C. When to use colons:

1. To explain or give an example:

We had my favourite food for dinner: pizza. (Pizza=my favourite food)

The thing he feared happened: he lost his job. (Losing his job=the thing he feared)

2. To introduce a quotation after a complete sentence:

Smith describes ways in which the virus is transmitted: "....."

3. To introduce a list after a complete sentence:

I like the following vegetables: carrots, peas, and potatoes.

**BUT** no colon is used after an incomplete thought

The vegetables I like are carrots, peas, and potatoes.

I like root vegetables, such as carrots, turnips, and parsnips.
