Helpful English Spelling Rules

Rule One: i before e except after c OR when it' a long a sound as in neighbour or weigh

- 1. (i before e): thief, grief, mischief, fierce, pierce, tier, pier, field
- 2. (after c): receive, perceive, receipt, ceiling
- 3. (long a): sleigh, freight, eight
 - Exceptions to the ie ei Rule: neither leisure foreign seized weird height Words with sh sound: ancient, sufficient, patient, efficient

Rule Two: Words ending in y

1. When the y comes after a consonant, change it to an i before adding a suffix except when the suffix is -ing

 $carry \rightarrow carried dry \rightarrow driest spy \rightarrow spied$

But: copy \rightarrow copying carry \rightarrow carrying dry \rightarrow drying

- When the y comes after a vowel do not change it to an i enjoy → enjoyed play → played
 - ➤ Exceptions: day → daily lay → laid pay → paid say → said
 - ➤ Also: Adjectives with one syllable keep the y before suffixes -ly and -ness shy → shyness/shyly sly → slyness/slyly dry → dryness/dryly

Rule Three: Words ending with a silent e

- Drop the e when you add a suffix beginning with a vowel argue → arguing create → creator force → forcible love → loveable
- 2. Keep the e when the suffix begins with a consonant fate → fateful safe → safety amuse → amusement fine → finely
- 3. Keep the e in words ending with ce or ge before suffixes -able and -ous courage → courageous notice → noticeable entice → enticeable

Rule Four: The doubling rule for words with one syllable

- 1. Double final consonants in one-syllable words before a suffix that begins with a vowel $tan \rightarrow tanning wrap \rightarrow wrapping tan \rightarrow tanned fat \rightarrow fatter$
- 2. Do not double when:
 - a) When the word ends in a double consonant: want \rightarrow wanting
 - b) When there are two vowels before the consonant: fear \rightarrow feared
 - c) When the suffix begins with a consonant: ship \rightarrow shipment

Rule Five: The doubling rule for words with more than one syllable

1. Double the final consonant before a suffix that begins with a vowel – if the stress is on the second syllable

admit \rightarrow admitted refer \rightarrow referred plan \rightarrow planned

- 2. Do not double when:
 - a) When the word ends in a double consonant: enchant \rightarrow enchanted
 - b) When there are two vowels before the final consonant: refuel \rightarrow refueled
 - c) When the suffix begins with a consonant: enchant \rightarrow enchantment

Rule Six: Adding -s or -es for plurals

- 1. When the word ends in s, sh, ch, x, or z, you add the -es ending to make a plural bus \rightarrow buses wish \rightarrow wishes match \rightarrow matches tax \rightarrow taxes quiz \rightarrow quizzes
- 2. For all other words, add the -s ending

cat \rightarrow cats river \rightarrow rivers monkey \rightarrow monkeys town \rightarrow towns
