Integrating Quotes into Paragraphs

You have presented a claim and have a strong supporting quote to bolster your position. How can this evidence be smoothly integrated into your paragraph?

Method One: Use a signal phrase separated from the quotation with a comma.

- Example with signal phrase verbs: <u>Park endorses such an approach when she argues</u>, "efficiency rates are consistently higher when supervisors permit a hybrid work model".
- Example without signal phrase verbs: According to Park, "efficiency rates are consistently higher when supervisors permit a hybrid work model".

Method Two: Make the quotation a part of your own sentence without any punctuation between your own words and the quotation.

- Example: <u>Park argues that</u> "efficiency rates are consistently higher when supervisors permit a hybrid work model".
- Example: <u>Trapper again reveals his sense of artistic insecurity when mumbling that</u> "[he] never could get the colour right no matter how many times [he] tried" (Chan 22).

Method Three: Introduce the quote with a complete sentence followed by a colon.

• Example: Lee's *Emerging Trends* explicitly supports the view that online shopping erodes mental health: "The isolation and obsessive tendencies nurtured by this type of consumer behavior has only intensified over time".

Method Four: Use short quotes – a few words or a phrase – as part of your own sentence.

• Example: The danger posed by online shopping, especially "[t]he isolation and obsessive tendencies" (Lee 89), can only be remedied by encouraging consumers to return to the public marketplace.
