# **Basic Sentence Structure**

#### **English Sentences follow five basic structures:**

#### 1. Subject + Verb

The subject is a noun or pronoun and the verb is the action that the subject does in the sentence. **Intransitive verbs** do not need an object.

- a. Lisa eats.
- b. Michael is sleeping.
- c. I danced.

#### 2. Subject + Verb + Direct Object

Some verbs need to have an object to be a complete sentence. These are called *transitive verbs*.

- a. I like flowers.
- b. John threw the ball.
- c. They watched a movie.

### 3. Subject + Linking Verb + Complement (Noun or Adjective)

**Linking verbs** show a state or explain what something is using nouns or adjectives.

- a. He is a police officer.
- b. The movie seems scary.
- c. Sylvia is beautiful

#### 4. Subject + Verb + Direct Object + Prepositional Phrase

Prepositional phrases include a **preposition** + an **object of the preposition** 

- a. They watched a movie at the theater.
- b. I painted the picture in art class.
- c. The boys are doing their homework on the computers.

### 5. Subject + Verb + Indirect Object + Direct Object

- a. I sent my grandmother a letter.
- b. Jason sang us a song.
- c. My parents bought me a birthday present...
